

The spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the child is recognised as being essential when providing an education for children. Children need to receive a 'broad and balanced curriculum that promotes good behaviour and safety. This belief is supported by all that work at this school. SMSC, particularly spiritual development, lies at the heart of the curriculum of a Church school, where it takes place in the context of Christian values. Schools play an important part in helping young people learn the difference between right and wrong, helping them to develop sound social skills and to make a positive contribution in community life; they also help young people to recognise the value and richness of cultural diversity in Britain. Church schools provide an atmosphere and understanding that encourages respect and acceptance of cultural diversity, although their commitment to the development and awareness and understanding of their Christian and cultural heritage should be explicit.

In developing the spirituality of children, we help them to become aware of:

- The human search for meaning and purpose of life which may lead to an understanding and belief of God
- The joy of being alive
- The beauty of the natural world
- The world of imagination and creativity
- The need to understand and value oneself and one's feelings
- The need to recognise the feelings and achievements of others

Moral Development

This relates to the child's developing understanding of what is "right" and "wrong". School will try to build on the moral training within the home while accepting that there might be different approaches between home and school.

Cultural Development

Development in this area allows the child to recognise that all cultural groups are distinctive. Culture is the embodiment of shared beliefs, knowledge, customs and values of that group. The child needs to appreciate the distinctive features of their own culture and those of others.

SMSC is embedded in the curriculum and teaching is enhanced through resources including: The World of Drugs, The Pride Program, Lucinda and Godfrey and SEAL. We also ensure a range of visitors and visits are included in our teaching, these include the school nurse, Crucial Crew, Pedestrian and Cycle training and links with the local Police Force.
